ACTIVITIES IN 2024



In 2024, RenovaBR consolidated its position as the main political training school in the country, training leaders committed to renewal and good public management. More than just numbers, RenovaBR's impact is reflected in the mobilization of thousands of people, the creation of local public policies and the strengthening of Brazilian democracy.

RenovaBR reaffirms its commitment to building a new generation of political leaders prepared to face Brazil's challenges. The impact of our training goes beyond the classroom and is reflected in concrete actions that transform communities and strengthen democracy. In 2024, more than training politicians, we train agents of change committed to a more efficient, transparent and representative country.

TRAINING



The training for the 2024 Elections was RenovaBR's main activity between 2023 and 2024. With the aim of training future candidates for the municipal elections, the training included around 236 hours of content, including recorded classes, synchronous classes, assessed activities, face-to-face meetings and optional activities.

The first class entered in the second semester of 2023, during which the highlights were the institutional welcome event (Aula Magna), the opening of the teaching and the start of thematic lectures with partner experts.

In 2024, a second class entered the course, totaling 2,509 students, and the two main activities of the course were promoted: Campaign Planning and Renew Brazil Day. At the end of the first semester of 2024, the students met in person to celebrate the end of the course at the Regional Meetings.

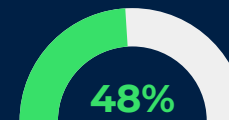

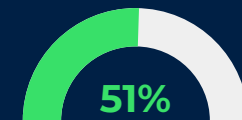

SELECTION PROCESS

The selection was made up of 6 stages in all, all of which were carried out by the candidates on Whatsapp. The first phase (stages 1 to 5) was qualifying and eliminatory, and served to ascertain all the candidate's talents and motivation to join RenovaBR. In the second phase (stage 6), the candidate was assessed on their skills and attitude that are consistent with a RenovaBR political leader, in an entirely eliminatory stage.

1. REGISTRATION

Filling in personal and socio-economic data and signing RenovaBR's Privacy Policy and Code of Conduct.

2. POLITICAL CONTEXT

Analysis of the political context at the time of registration: candidacy, party affiliation, mobilization, use of social networks, campaign budget, etc.

3. QUESTIONNAIRE ON POINT OF VIEW

Analysis of political alignment and opinions on issues such as the economy, customs, religion, the importance of democracy and others.

4. CITIZENSHIP IN FOCUS

Analysis of the position on basic fundamentals of citizenship and democracy with questions on democracy, integrity in politics, diversity and inclusion and community leadership.

5. VIDEO PRESENTATION

Short 1 and a half minute presentation on the candidate's motivations, values, skills and abilities.

6. VIRTUAL BANK

Simulated parliamentary vote on a fictitious bill to assess argumentation and negotiation skills.

The aim of this methodology was to bring practice to the political experience from the selection stage and, in a simplified way, to propose to the candidates a simulation of a vote in the City Council so that the candidates had to articulate and vote on an amendment to a fictitious Bill. In 2023, there were 64 committees, with 1,758 evaluated candidates.

Since 2019, RenovaBR has integrated social impact actions into its training courses through '*Dia de Renovar o Brasil*', encouraging its students to apply the values of civic participation and commitment to the community in practice. This initiative allows each participant to develop and carry out a social project in their municipality, choosing the agenda, the target audience and the implementation strategy.

In 2024, the 'Dia de Renovar o Brasil', reached a significant milestone: **1,016 projects carried out simultaneously in 591 municipalities in all regions of Brazil**, addressing key issues such as citizenship, education and health. The states with the greatest engagement were São Paulo, Minas Gerais, Rio de Janeiro, Pernambuco and Paraná.

According to the students' own estimates, the actions impacted 4 million people in a single day - a reflection of the power of politics when connected to the reality and needs of society.

By connecting political training with practical experience of social engagement, the 'Dia de Renovar o Brasil' reinforces the importance of local action and prepares students to face the concrete challenges of public management and take office closer to the people and committed to building a fairer and more inclusive country.

REGIONAL MEETINGS

Marking the end of the training, six face-to-face meetings were held in different parts of the country to provide valuable connections between students, mentors and experts and to celebrate the class's achievements.

The meetings took place in the cities of Belo Horizonte, Brasília, Curitiba, Recife, Rio de Janeiro and São Paulo between May and June 2024, with a total of 688 students taking part, who covered their own transportation and accommodation costs.

In addition to the theoretical content offered by the teachers, the students were able to exchange experiences about their expectations for the electoral campaign and political consolidation. At the end of each event, a graduation ceremony was held and diplomas were awarded to each of the graduates.

Face-to-face meetings are a fundamental part of RenovaBR's strategy to create links and foster a powerful network of political leaders across the country.

In total, 688 students attended a meeting. All face-to-face events were rated positively, with an average NPS of 93, an average usefulness score of 9.61 and an average relevance score of 9.28.

CLOSING OF THE 2023/2024 CYCLE

At the end of the 2023/2024 initial training cycle, 2,509 students took part in our activities and 1,643 completed the entire training course and graduated. 1,459 were new members of the RenovaBR network.

CONTINUOUS EDUCATION



COURSE SCHOOL OF PUBLIC MANAGEMENT WITH OEA

In 2024, RenovaBR signed an unprecedented partnership with the Organization of American States (OAS) and Microsoft to launch its first training course aimed exclusively at public managers.

Completely free of charge, the program trained 142 public leaders from the municipal, state and federal spheres in three main topics:

- Ethics and transparency in public governance
- Techniques and strategies for efficient negotiations
- Assertive, public and digital communication

Taking place between April 22 and May 27, with a total of 26 hours of content, the classes were conducted online by renowned experts such as **Ana Carla Abrão, Silverio Zebral Filho (OAS), Ronan Damasco, Carlos Ari Sunfeld, Deniza Gurgel, Felipe Guzman Ramirez, Juan Felipe Yepes Gonzales and Pepe Tonin.**

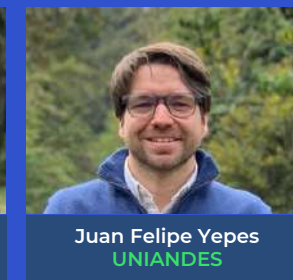

In addition to the regular classes, the program featured a masterclass broadcast on the Um Brasil channel, with the participation of Armínio Fraga (former President of the Central Bank of Brazil), Paulo Hartung (RenovaBR Board Member), Silverio Zebral Filho (OAS) and political scientist Humberto Dantas, addressing Brazil's economic and political challenges.

The School of Public Management has not only trained managers in Brazil, but has also become the basis for expanding the initiative to leaders in Latin America, through Democracy+, in training that will run until 2025.

TRAINING FOR ELECTED OFFICIALS



GOVERNMENT PLANS

For the first time, RenovaBR developed a training course entirely focused on the construction of government plans, responding to a real need identified among the students in cycle 23/24. When we profiled the participants, it became clear that many planned to run for office in the municipal executive, making specific training essential for this stage of the political journey.

In partnership with Fundação Instituto de Pesquisas Econômicas (FIPE) and with the support of Microsoft, we have created an unprecedented program in Brazil, divided into two complementary phases:

The first, held in May 2024, aimed to support pre-election candidates in drawing up consistent government plans, aligned with the real needs of their municipalities. This process involved 220 participants from all over the country and included 12 lectures given by experts, including the inaugural class led by Paulo Hartung, former governor of Espírito Santo and RenovaBR Board Member. At the beginning of June, evaluation panels helped improve the plans of around 20 pre-candidates.

The second phase, held in person in São Paulo in December 2024, brought together elected mayors and deputy mayors from the RenovaBR Network to transform their government plans into strategic roadmaps for implementation throughout their term of office. Over three days, the participants took part in practical dynamics, debates and applied challenges, ensuring that their proposals got off the drawing board and became concrete management commitments.

At the end of the program, the 44 mayors and 25 deputy mayors elected from the RenovaBR Network left with a structured plan for their terms in office, prepared to face administrative challenges and implement public policies more efficiently.



Once again, RenovaBR has not only trained political leaders, but has ensured that these leaders have the necessary tools to deliver concrete results to the population.

DEVELOPMENT AND LEADERSHIP PROGRAM FOR COUNCILORS



For many newly-elected councilors, the start of their term brings complex challenges: understanding how the City Council works, building political links, drafting viable projects and responding to the expectations of the population. The lack of legislative experience can lead to insecurity, making it difficult to transition into a leadership and decision-making role.

To prepare them for this journey and strengthen their performance from the first day in office, RenovaBR has structured exclusive training with a specific workload for its elected councilors.

In addition to training the councilors for the start of their term, the training was also an opportunity for the re-elected councilors to share their experiences and challenges with first-time delegates, promoting an exchange of knowledge that is essential for strengthening the RBR Alumni community.

The training was divided into two modules: the first, held virtually in November, included five live classes on Zoom, allowing participants to delve deeper into key topics before the face-to-face meeting. Participation in this module was a prerequisite for the second phase, held in partnership with Insper and supported by the Brava Foundation, on December 13 in São Paulo.

Of the **295 elected councilors** in the RenovaBR Network, **240 took part in the online module and 200 attended the in-person meeting**. The results demonstrate the relevance of the initiative: **the online module had an average NPS of 81.6 and a usefulness score of 9.67, while the in-person module achieved an NPS of 95 and average usefulness of 9.3**, reinforcing the impact of the training on the preparation of the elected officials.



Taking part in Insper's training for councilors, in partnership with RenovaBR, was extremely important at the start of my mandate, so that I could structure what I want to deliver in terms of results for the people of Cuiabá.

On December 14, RenovaBR, in partnership with Insper, held the Municipal Leaders Summit, an event that brought together 206 participants elected in 2024, representing 146 municipalities from 20 Brazilian states.

The program included an institutional opening with Guilherme Martins, president of Insper, and Eduardo Mufarej, founder of RenovaBR, who stressed the importance of strengthening municipal leadership in the Brazilian democratic context.

Among the highlights of the event were:

- The former governor of Espírito Santo and president of the RenovaBR Board, Paulo Hartung, reflected on Brazil's prospects and challenges in the municipalities.
- Leandro Piquet Carneiro, a professor at USP and a specialist in public security, who spoke about the importance of integrated strategies for tackling crime in the territories.
- The federal deputy and Municipal Secretary of Health of Rio de Janeiro, Daniel Soranz, brought reflections on the challenges of public health in municipalities and presented practical solutions applied in the capital of Rio de Janeiro.

During the summit, leaders who went through RenovaBR's training process shared their experiences and the paths they took in politics:

- The deputy mayor of Tracunhaém (PE), Áurea, and the mayor of Uberaba (MG), Elisa Araújo, presented the challenges faced and the solutions implemented in their administrations.
- Councilors Joyce Trindade (Rio de Janeiro/RJ) and Jefferson Cezarolli (São Vicente/SP) spoke about the importance of political action that is close to the population and seeks concrete results.
- The closing ceremony was marked by inspiring testimonies from RenovaBR leaders who continue to impact their communities. Councilors Elisa (Taubaté/SP) and Luma Menezes (Alagoinhas/BA), state deputy Léo Siqueira (SP) and federal deputy Duarte Júnior (MA) shared their trajectories and reinforced RenovaBR's role in the political transformation of Brazil.

RBR 2024 CENSUS: THE IMPACT OF OUR COMMUNITY

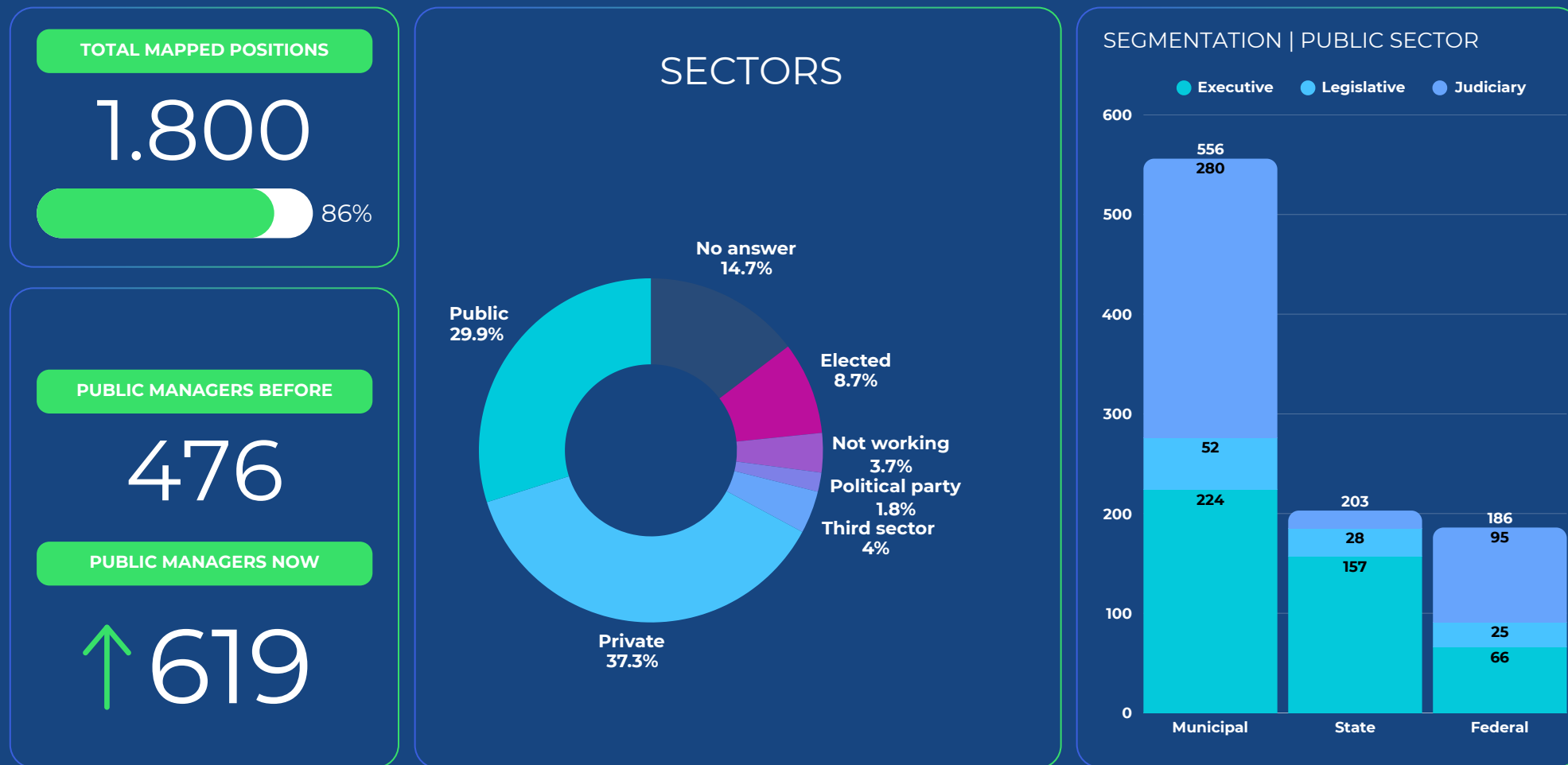
In April 2024, we carried out the AlumniRBR Radar to update our database and map the impact of leaders, who are constantly on the move politically and professionally.

Mapping 86% of the public-political trajectories of the then 2,071 alumni, we identified that the number of RenovaBR leaders in the public sector grew from 476 to 619, reflecting the network's impact on the transformation of society.

29% said they worked directly in public management in different branches and levels of government. In addition, 6.8% were in the third sector and in party structures, expanding our influence in politics and in building solutions for the country. And for 2025 we are counting the impact of the new Alumni and their careers in politics, public management or impact.

With the conclusion of the Elections 2024 Training in June, we reached the mark of 3,523 leaders trained by RenovaBR, an increase of 1,452 new leaders committed to political renewal in the country.

To accompany this expansion, throughout the year we promoted various initiatives with the aim of offering resources, knowledge and support for the development of public-political trajectories, broadening their impact and strengthening careers:

Meeting of Women



With the 2024 municipal elections approaching, in March we held a face-to-face meeting in São Paulo for women from the AlumniRBR Network, responding to challenges such as isolation, invisibility and hostility in the political environment. In partnership with the Women of Brazil Group, we promoted an event aimed at developing practical public speaking skills and building support networks with experienced leaders.

With the aim of bringing together people with different opinions and positions, we held two panels during the event:

- "How can image, tone and speech help in elections?", was led by RenovaBR's Executive Director, Bruna Barros, with the participation of São Paulo State Deputy Marina Helou (REDE) and Raquel Gallinati, Santos' secretary of security.
- "Tips on electoral oratory", with Micarla Lins, TED Speaker.

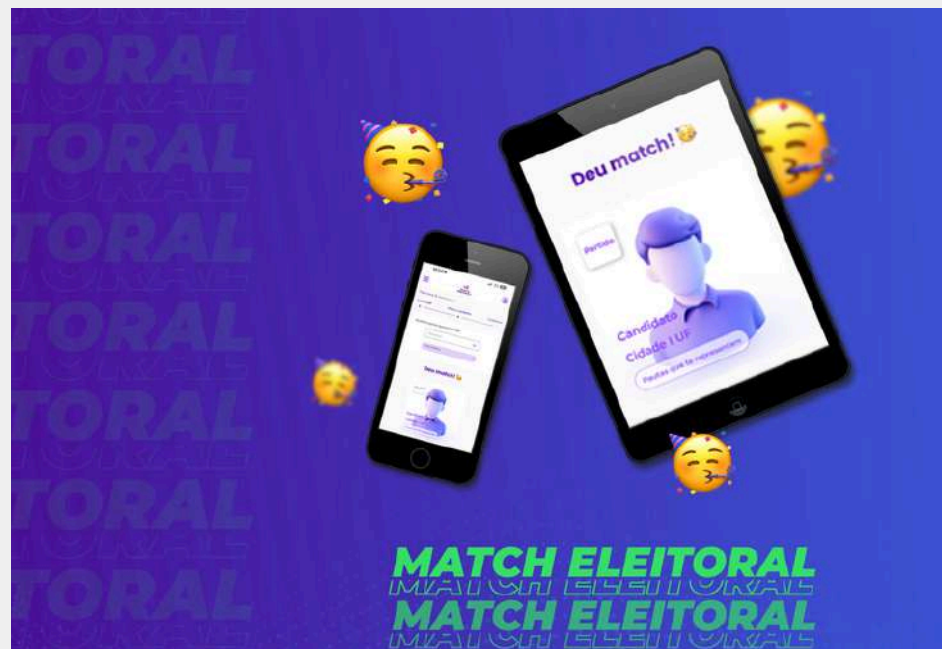

In 2024, RenovaBR participated in the **Strengthening Democratic Leadership** in Latin America program, an initiative of VélezReyes+ in partnership with Stanford University.

During five days of immersion, the program brought together organizations from the region to deepen the teaching methods of the Leadership Academy for Development (LAD), of the Stanford Center on Democracy, Development and the Rule of Law.

RenovaBR was represented by the Executive Director, **Rodrigo Matsumoto Cobra**, and the Education Coordinator, **Marjorie Lynn**, who took part in an intense agenda of lectures, debates and case studies on the challenges and prospects of democracy in Latin America. Among the highlights of the program were the conferences with Francis Fukuyama, who presented the lecture "Structure of Problem Solving", and Larry Diamond, with his analysis of "The Global Democratic Recession." Topics such as the US elections and their impact on Latin America, administrative decentralization in Peru and the challenges facing Latin American democracies were also debated.

"The training was extremely important for RenovaBR, both for learning about the most relevant issues of democracy and for uniting different institutions of public leadership in Latin America," said RenovaBR's Executive Director, Rodrigo Cobra.



During the event, RenovaBR and VélezReyes+ signed a fundamental commitment for the future of democracy in the region: the creation of Democracia+, an initiative that aims to strengthen democracy in Latin America through a regional network of independent, multi-party local organizations that promote deeply democratic and effective political leadership across the ideological spectrum.

Also participating in the initiative are the organizations Recambio (Peru), Exstituto (Colombia), +Uruguay (Uruguay), +Costa Rica (Costa Rica), Potencia Argentina (Potencia Argentina).

Elections 2024 Results

On October 6, 2024, Brazil consolidated another important step in its democracy with the municipal elections. Against a backdrop of great political polarization, the result of the polls showed Brazilians' desire for an ethical, inclusive renewal committed to the public good.

RenovaBR has a lot to celebrate: its leaders won victories in several cities across the country, showing that the population trusts leaders who promote transparency, dialog and public policies based on data and evidence.

The figures express the diversity and impact of the leaders trained by the organization: among those elected are men and women from different races, social backgrounds and political parties, all committed to ethics and inclusion.

In the two rounds of elections, RenovaBR leaders won 296 councilor seats and 69 mayorships and deputy mayorships across Brazil, spread over 292 municipalities.

Those elected now have the mission of implementing a new way of doing politics, based on ethics, transparency and commitment to the public good.

Of those elected by RenovaBR, 26% are women, which is higher than the national average of 17% of those elected in the country. Among the elected leaders, there is a diversity of race, social origin and party affiliation, reflecting the school's efforts to train politicians who represent the plurality of Brazilian society.

Those elected are spread across 22 states and belong to 24 parties, which reinforces RenovaBR's commitment to supporting leaders from different positions on the political spectrum.

The distribution of elected representatives by region also reflects this diversity: Midwest (6.03%), Northeast (20%), North (4.38%), Southeast (48.22%) and South (21.37%).

The leaders elected by RenovaBR now have the opportunity to put into practice the innovative and inclusive policies they defended throughout the campaign, transforming their cities into fairer and more democratic spaces.

These victories show that Brazil is increasingly open to political renewal, trusting leaders who value transparency and dialog as pillars of their administrations.

G20 summit meeting in Brazil

ITCMD exemption

We were granted exemption from the ITCMD tax on donations for a period of three years, as we are an organization certified by the State of São Paulo as promoting human rights, in accordance with the legislation. This exemption generated savings of R\$90,000 in 2023 and is estimated to save more than R\$1 million in expenses by 2026.

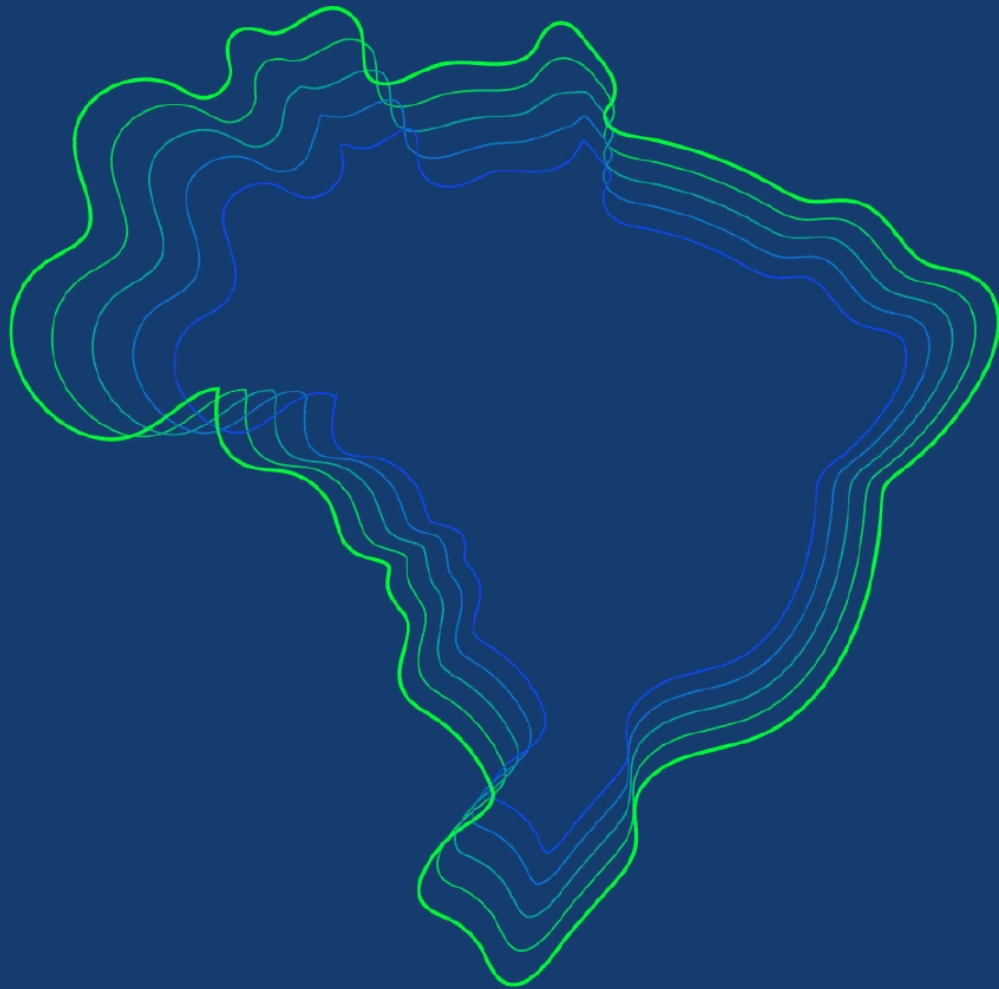

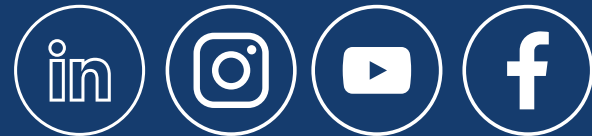
